


Attendance every day counts.


Thank you for realising the importance of sending your child to school every day.

From making new friends and getting to know the school environment, through to helping raise much needed funds and making a difference to the children and school community. All of these things help you grow in confidence as a parent and it feels good to know you are making a difference for your children and for generations to come.

Attendance – Every Day Counts

We have produced this special notice on attendance to provide parents and carers with a clear outline on the absence procedures at St Nicholas and the Local Authorities responses to poor pupil attendance.

The Governors have made it clear that they will support the Headteacher and Schools Liasion Officer (SLO) in promoting high levels of attendance, and where required they will support the actions of the school where there is an unsatisfactory reasons for absence. Unbroken attendance is important for learning. However, there will be times when absence is unavoidable and acceptable. This notice explains the approach we are following to manage attendance.

Types of Absence:

Each absence is classed as authorised or unauthorised. Authorised absences are given when reasons are considered valid. Unauthorised absences are given where no explanation or unacceptable reasons are given.

Unacceptable Reasons:

The following reasons are not acceptable:

- shopping visits
- care for family members
- days out to theme parks or to attend concerts/shows for a birthday or family occasion
- parents' work commitments or business trips
- holidays taken in term time (including long weekends taken on Fridays and/or Mondays)
- parental illness
- sibling illness

All unauthorised absences are reviewed by the Local Authority SchoolLiasion Officer (SLO).

Illness and First Day Call:

If your child is unable to attend school through illness you should inform us by telephone on the first day of absence before 9:00am, report your child's absence on MCAS or go into the Office if able to or if dropping off a sibling. Please make sure you give a reason as to how your child is poorly. It is useful to know the expected day of return. If you do not supply us with this information, we have a duty to contact you, so we may be sure of the child's whereabouts as this is a safeguarding measure.

Where the child is absent through illness or medical appointments this will normally be counted as authorised. Where we have concerns over excessive absence patterns through illness, we will need to discuss this with parents in order to gain a better understanding of the problems and to offer support – for example by involving the School Health Services.

Medical/Dental Appointments:

It is generally better if these can be arranged **outside school hours**, but we know this is not always possible. Where children need to attend such appointments during the school day it is important that parents come first to the Office before collecting children. Please bring your child to the office on returning from the appointment. Please indicate in advance whether s/he will be returning for the midday meal.

Emergency Occasions:

There are some occasions e.g., bereavements, family problems, etc where it may be inappropriate for children to attend school; we will be sympathetic to such requests.

Lateness:

Please try to ensure that your child arrives at school so that they are present for registration; this is done at 8:45am each day. Meeting and exchanging news with friends before school is important for the children's social development. Lateness causes problems over register marking and missed instructions at the start of a lesson and it can be embarrassing for the child.

What we are aiming for:

Average attendance would be around 96% for the year, with outstanding attendance being above this.



Safeguarding - Looking after ALL pupils

We would like to share with you the academy's policy in ensuring that all our children are taught and encouraged to live healthy lifestyles and adopt safe practices. Policies are in place to ensure that there is a consistent approach to practices throughout the academy and that they are understood and adhered to by staff, governors and volunteers.

Adults have a tremendous impact on young children and with this in mind, it is an expectation that all adults and visitors at St Nicholas:

- Are good role models for students
- Enjoy their work and working with students
- · Are conscientious and hardworking
- Welcome and support visitors to school
- Recognise and value strengths in each other and use these to support everyone.
- Work with the agreed policies of the school
- · Promote a happy, caring and safe school
- Encourage students to think for themselves, ask questions and find answers
- Create an environment of trust whereby students are trusted to work seriously
- Challenge and support students in their learning.

There are numerous policies in place at St Nicholas to safeguard our children and they include:

Safeguarding Children and adults at St Nicholas Academy.

All visitors to school are expected to pre-arrange their visit with the required member of staff at least 24 hours in advance of the visit.

<u>Unannounced visitors</u> - In the event of you or others attending a meeting in school, all visitors where they are unknown to the school are required to show proof of identity to our reception staff before the meeting takes place.

Child protection

This is a sensitive area in which all staff receive regular training. Here, school and other services for children and families all work together to support the needs of students. At St Nicholas, **we have a Designated Safeguarding Lead – Mrs Turner, Deputy Headteacher**. We also have a named governor responsible for safeguarding & child protection – Mrs L Edwards. The child protection policy can be viewed on the school website.

Attendance and punctuality

Students' attendance and punctuality at school is monitored on a daily basis and notable absences, lateness or patterns of absence are followed up by the Attendance Team. In cases where absence or lateness to school is persistent the Schools Liaison Officer will work with families to support them in removing any barriers to learning.

Our behaviour policy is reviewed annually and can be found on the school website. Students are reminded frequently about our school rules and they know that we have them in order to keep everyone safe and happy.

Health and safety

The school has a named Health and Safety officer (Mr C. Dale – Headteacher). The school has several fully trained first aiders, who deal with accidents where they occur. There is also a named governor responsible for health and safety – Mrs L Edwards. We also aim to ensure that students are regularly informed about health and safety through assemblies, wall displays and clear instructional signs around the school.

Curriculum



Healthy eating, physical exercise and safety are taught in our curriculum. These areas of life skill development are also brought to life by the many educational visits we undertake and professionals we invite police officers and other emergency service personnel to talk to the students about issues such as road safety, safeguarding and drugs awareness.

Safer recruitment and selection of staff

We are governed by law to ensure staff members are right and proper to work with children. Governors and the school ensure that all staff new to the school and volunteers who work in school on a regular basis undertake an enhanced Disclosure and Barring Service (DBS) identity check, rigorous interviews and full references before a person takes up a post.

Operation Encompass

Our school is part of Operation Encompass which is a national scheme that operates jointly between schools and Kent County Police forces.

Operation Encompass is the reporting to schools, prior to the start of the next school day, when a police officer has visited the home of a child or young person where domestic violence has been recorded in the family home. As a school we have ensured that a member of our staff, (The Headteacher) known as the Key Adult, has been trained in the Operation Encompass procedures, allowing us to then use the information which has been shared, in confidence, to support the child/ren in our care.

The Domestic Abuse Act 2021 identifies children who experience domestic abuse as victims of domestic abuse in their own right. We are keen to offer the best support possible to all our pupils and we believe this will be extremely beneficial for all those involved.

Parents will be contacted by the school where the police have informed the school of such a visit.
