
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Dear St Nicholas Community.






Attendance every day counts.

Safer Internet Day 2025 – February 2025

Safer Internet Day 2025 will take place on the 11th of February 2025, with celebrations and learning based around the theme 'Too good to be true? Protecting yourself and others from scams online

Safer Internet Day is the UK's biggest celebration of online safety. Each year we cover an online issue or theme that speaks about the things young people are seeing and experiencing online. Created in consultation with young




people across the UK, this year Safer Internet Day will be focusing on the issue of scams online and for young people, how to protect themselves and others, as well as what support is available to them.

This Safer Internet Day we will assess the real scale of this issue and allow young people to share their experiences and ideas on how to tackle the problem. We'll build on the important work being done to raise awareness of issues such as online financial sextortion and we'll also consider the future of scams, answering questions such as:

- How is changing technology like generative AI going to impact the approach of scammers?
- What role can the government and internet industry take to tackle this threat?
- And what changes would young people like to see to help protect themselves moving forward?

Suave, means charming. In that sense it is usually applied to people. However, it also means sophisticated elegant and debonair – a perfect description for many wonderful words in the English language.

Suave words are usually words that children do not regularly meet in their normal daily exposure to reading, listening to stories, watching or listening to programmes or in a conversation at home or in school.

We use **SAUVE** words to give our children a greater exposure to some of these words and enrich their word power.
